From DDC – Research - Genetics of Canine Hyper-Sociability

This article was submitted by a club member to share with those who might be interested.

Dear Devoted Dog Owner,

DDC Veterinary is excited about research being conducted on the Genetics of Canine Hyper-Sociability. The study is being performed by Dr. Bridgett M. vonHoldt, Department of Ecology & Evolutionary Biology, at Princeton University.

What is **Canine Hyper-Sociability**?

 Genetic findings provide a possible story for how humans domesticated wolves into dogs, which is suggested to have been through "the survival of the friendliest." The research group recently identified mutations in a handful of genes that influence how friendly a dog or wolf is towards humans.

For more information, visit the <u>Canine Hyper-Sociability</u> website. Dr. vonHoldt is working to develop a successful genetic survey for these mutations from dogs' DNA samples. Her group needs samples from all types of dogs. If you choose to participate, Dr. vonHoldt will send you a short report describing the number and type of gene variants your dog carries.

Want to join the study? Here's what you need to do:

- Stage 1: Basic data collection Three forms:
 The consent form, demographic information and a short 42-question behavioral assessment of each individual dog. All forms can also be found on the project's website.
- Stage 2: Behavioral video data collection Two short behavioral tests you can conduct and record at home with your dog! Sociability test and Problem Solving test
- Stage 3: Genetic sample donation Once all of the forms and video tests have been received by Dr. vonHoldt, she will send qualified participants the non-invasive
- <u>cheek swab kit</u> that can be collected at home, without the need for a vet visit. (Whole blood samples also accepted.)

*Board of Directors. Attends General and Board meetings. Makes suggestions and decisions concerning Club functions.

Logging into GGLRC Website

For those of you have forgotten the GGLRC Website login process, or may have never received the steps. These have been provided by our special Webmistress – Elaine Nusser. Thanks Elaine for keeping the website up to date for us. If you have issues or questions, please contact your Newsletter Editor and I'll get you Elaine's contact information.

STEPS:

Many members have logins and passwords already for the website's Members Only area. But for those who don't, here are the instructions:

- 1. Go to http://www.gglrc.org
- 2. Click on the "MEMBERS ONLY" tab at the top right side of the window. A sign-in area will pop down.
- 3. If you are a GGLRC member in good standing, you may register here under the "Request

Members-Only Access" area. Just type in your Name and Email address, and click the "Register" button.

Please note that this is not an automated password service, I will get your request, check your email against the current membership list, then generate the login information and send it back to you. This may take up to 1-2 days depending on my schedule.

Once you have the login information, you should go back to the club website, click on the same "MEMBERS ONLY" tab where you originally requested the password, and this time click the "LOGIN" button. You will be asked for your user name and password, and once that validates, you will be taken to the Members Only page.

The Members Only page has access to newsletter archives, club member contact information, GGLRC club documents and forms.

SUMMERTIME AND DOGS

Summertime is a great time for us to get out and enjoy the sunshine and longer daylight. It also means you can almost guarantee the temperature's can be extremely hot in some areas. So if you and your dog are planning to partake in some solar activities, make sure you take a few extra minutes and plan ahead.

Here's some tips provided by AVMA:

- 1. Never leave your dog in the car, even if you leave the windows cracked.
- Make sure your dog has unlimited access to fresh water.
- 3. Make sure your dog has access to shade.
- 4. Take walks in the cooler hours of the day.
- 5. When walking, try to stay off of hot surfaces (like asphalt) because it can burn your dog's feet.
- If you think it's hot outside, it's even hotter for your dog. Make sure your dog has a way to cool off.

7. Keep you eyes open for Rattlesnakes when walking on trails or fields. It might be helpful to keep your dog on a leash in these areas.

And don't forget water, sunscreen, a hat and sunglasses for you and your family.
